- Vs. 1-2: A call to humble worship
- Vs. 3-9: Compares God's might to the power of a thunderstorm on Mt. Hermon
- Vs. 10-11: A promise for God's people

Calvin on Psalm 29

"What a monstrous thing is it, that while all the irrational portion of the creation tremble before God, men alone, who are endued with sense and reason, are not moved! Moreover, though they possess genius and learning, they employ enchantments to shut their ears against God's voice, however powerful, lest it should reach their hearts. Philosophers think not that they have reasoned skillfully enough about inferior causes, unless they separate God very far from his works. It is a diabolical science, however, which fixes our contemplations on the works of nature, and turns them away from God."
